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Lesson Two: Devotional Life *(time with Jesus)*

God wants to spend time with you! One of God’s deepest desires is for you to know Him and have a relationship with Him. We can pray at any time of the day and at any place. God is everywhere and wants to be involved in every part of your life. Developing a relationship with a person requires consistent interaction with that person. In the same way, if you want to have a close relationship with God, you need to set aside daily time just for God. This “set apart” time for seeking God is our devotion life.

Story on the power of answered prayer

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God wants to speak to us through His Word – the Bible.

God speaks to us by the Holy Spirit in a variety of ways. Yet every potential truth about God is always found in the Bible. The Bible was written over a 1500 year span by over forty authors in three languages. It records over 1000 references to fulfilled prophecies and an eyewitness account of a supernatural miracle of God in most of its 66 books. The Bible is regarded as the most reliable text of any piece of literature ever. It has been translated into other languages more than any other book. And for 2000 years countless lives have been transformed by its message. The Bible is God's Word to us. He said perfectly what He wanted to say through imperfect people. He speaks to us through His Word today.

How to get started with your devotional life

1. **Prepare for God** – Find a time where you can consistently meet with God. Choose a place where you can meet with God without being disturbed. Collect items you may need for your time with God: a Bible, journal, pen, music and a calendar.
2. **Worship God** – Sing songs of praise to God. Thank God for something good in your life. (Psalm 100; Romans 12:1-2)
3. **Bible reading** – Choose a book in the Bible to study using the three simple questions above. If you have never read the Bible before, begin with a gospel. Consider how what you read applies to your life and obey everything Jesus says to do.
4. **Prayer** - Share your concerns for yourself and others with God through prayer.
5. **Wait on God** – Listen for His encouragement, correction and direction. Write down what you sense God saying to you in a journal. (Psalm 143:8)

Make it a part of your daily routine. It is your decision to meet with God. Spending time with God will not make God love you more, but if you seek God everyday, you will grow in your love for Him and obedience to Him. (Matthew 6:33)

Church life

The best description of church life in the New Testament is more of a series of snapshots than a definition. Numerous passages help us see what Jesus intended for His body, the church.

Acts of Obedience

Jesus has instructed us to obey all that He has commanded. Baptism, the observance of communion, and giving are three specific commands Jesus gave us that demonstrate our relationship and commitment not only to him, but also to other believers.

Baptism

Water baptism is a public declaration that you believe in Jesus. Baptism is not optional but the first command Jesus has given new believers (Acts 2:38). Water baptism is a symbolic act through emersion in water. It does not have the power to forgive sin. But baptism does signify to the world, "I am not ashamed to identify with Jesus Christ or His family."

Communion

We call this ordinance from Jesus "communion" or "the Lord's Supper." It ought to be regularly observed by the people of God gathered. When we receive communion, it is a time to examine our actions and faith (1 Corinthians 11:23-29), to remember what He has done for us on the cross and renew our covenant of love together with Him.

God also asks the church to be a giving community. Monetary giving is often a test of a Christian's faith, love and obedience. Everything we have is from God, and He is our provider. We can trust Him with our money and our lives.

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Lesson Four: Father Heart of God

God our Father

In the New Testament, we come to know Him as Father, Son (Jesus) and Holy Spirit. When Jesus came he showed us what the Father is like and how to have a relationship with Him. He also taught His disciples to address God in prayer saying, "Our Father who art in heaven." When you come to faith in Jesus, you are adopted into God's family (Romans 8:15). God becomes your father.

We need the baptism of the Holy Spirit so that we can do the works that Jesus did – even greater ones (Hebrews 2:4). The Holy Spirit also gives us gifts to serve the church and extend the Kingdom of God. These gifts are abilities that are supernaturally empowered by God. Every believer in Jesus has at least one primary spiritual gift to contribute to the body of Christ.

Receiving the Holy Spirit

The Baptism of the Holy Spirit occurs in a variety of ways throughout the New Testament. There is no one method for being baptized with the Holy Spirit. Neither is there only one demonstration of the Spirit. The following are common, biblical characteristics of those who experience the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

Receiving the Baptism of the Spirit includes... Verse

A desire for Justice	<i>“those that hunger and thirst for righteousness...will be filled.”</i> (Matthew 5:6 NIV)
A desire for spiritual gifts	<i>“eagerly desire spiritual gifts”</i> (1 Corinthians 14:1 NIV)
Confessing all known sins	<i>“Many who became believers confessed their sinful practices.”</i> (Acts 19:18 NLT)
Coming to Jesus and believing	<i>“Anyone who is thirsty may come to me! Anyone who believes in me... Rivers of living water [Holy Spirit] will flow from his heart.”</i> (John 7:37-38 NLT)
Asking the Father in prayer	<i>“your heavenly Father give(s) the Holy Spirit to those who ask him.”</i> (Luke 11:13)
Potential manifestations like prophecy or tongues or joy or boldness	<i>“The Holy Spirit came on them and they spoke in other tongues and prophesied.”</i> (Acts 19:6 – See also Acts 4:31-35; 13:53)

Living by the Spirit

We are “sealed within” by the Holy Spirit when we are saved, but we are also encouraged to “be continually filled” with the Holy Spirit (*Ephesians 5:18; John 20:22; Acts 2:4, 4:31*). The Holy Spirit desires for us to have a personal and regular encounter with God that draws us close to Him and empowers us to glorify Him on earth.
