Riverside Home Group Discussion Guide

Scripture Text to accompany the themes of the Sunday Sermon; Acts 2:42-47 (NIV)

⁴²They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

General Question Bank

<u>Observation</u> (what does the text say?) <u>Interpretation</u> (what does it mean?) <u>Application</u> (what does it mean to me/us?) <u>Know</u> (what does the text say about God?) <u>Be</u> (what does it say about us?) <u>Do</u> (what does it call us to do?) <u>Together</u> (What is our communal identity/response according to the passage/Holy Spirit?)

Discussion/Topic Starter (Ice Breaker)

• What excites you the most about a given day or week in your life? Are these things planned or do they generally happen spontaneously?

Acts 2:42-47

- O: What things in the text strike you or jump out at you? Why?
 - ***Another way to ask: "Choose one verse or phrase from the passage that stands out to you. This could be something you're intrigued by, something that makes you uncomfortable, something that puzzles you, something that resonates with you, or just something you want to examine further." Now share it with the group
- O: In the book of Acts, we are given a window into the life of the first community of believers soon after the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost when three thousand people came to faith in Christ. What stands out to you from this passage?
- O: Based on this one passage, how would you describe this community's Rule of Life? Describe the activities/disciplines they used to grow and mature in Christ.
 - A few weeks ago, Ila shared a story, adapted from Parker Palmer's writing, about farmers who would prepare for blizzards by tying a rope from the back door of their house out to the barn as a guide to ensure they could return safely home. These blizzards came quickly and fiercely and were highly dangerous. Many froze to death in those blizzards, disoriented by their inability to see. They wandered in circles, lost sometimes in their own backyards. If they lost their grip on the rope, it became impossible for them to find their way home. Some froze within feet of their own back door, never realizing how close they were to safety. Reflect on these questions related to life's blizzards:
- I: What is the nature of your blizzard at this time?
- I: What contributes to your blizzard? What does it look like? Feel like?
- I: What does that blizzard obscure? What gets "lost"?
- A: We each need a rope to keep us connected to God. Notice that every rope is actually made up of a series of smaller, intertwined threads. In light of your life at this time, what "threads" do you want to make up your rope (Rule of Life)?
- A: Revisit the Rule of Life worksheet that was distributed on Sunday. Spend some time working through this alone or as a group as each of you think more intentionally about Rule of Life.
- A: Think about this home group's rule of life? What do we want to resume, stop, or start practicing as a group together?

-How WILL you respond this week? What one question do you want us to ask of you next week in regard to this?

Recommended Follow-up:

- <u>Pray:</u> Pray together, and really focus in on that we are meeting with God, He's in the room, and He wants us to KNOW Him. Pray together, spend some time being silent (so we can listen, aka, "Whoever has ears, let them hear what the Spirit says to the churches." Then pray in response to the content from this letter in Revelation as well as to what the H.S. reveals to us.
- Respond: Spend this week responding to God's word as fleshed out in the group time, as well as journey through this week's devotional guide.

An explanation on how Riverside structures these discussion guides*:

Riverside defines a disciple of Jesus as a <u>"Know, Be, Do"</u> person. And since Jesus told us to "make disciples" we use the "Know, Be, Do" framework in our discussion guides. We believe the process for this transformation happens in community, hence the **"Together"** part of the Riverside mission as well.

Riverside leadership regularly asks questions around these areas:

- "What do we need to **know** about God?"
- "Who do we need to **be**?"
- "What do we need to **do**?"
- "Together, what is our communal identity/response according to the passage/Holy Spirit?

Here is what we mean by "Know, Be, Do" (based on Colossians 1:9-10, see below)

Know – "to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives..., growing in the knowledge of God." Not just knowing about Jesus, but knowing Him personally, intimately, and deeply. This is also about knowing the scriptures, knowing the voice of the Holy Spirit, even knowing yourself.

Be – "so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way." Becoming more like Jesus (sanctification). This is about our character and our heart and our motivations, our passions and convictions change the more we get to Know Jesus (and others).

Do – "bearing fruit in every good work, …" Knowing Jesus and Becoming like Jesus practically will change our actions. As we grow in these areas we will naturally DO the things that Jesus did while in the flesh on earth (living and loving like Jesus). Some broad categories around DO are evangelism and justice and service.

Notice "bearing fruit in every good work" then yields more "growing in the knowledge of God." In other words, while "Know, Be, Do" are three distinct words, they are deeply interconnected.

As a side note, the next chapter states: § So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, 7 rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness. § See to it that no one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and the elemental spiritual forces of this world rather than on Christ. (Col. 2:6-8) To aid in this process Riverside also has a daily devotional guide available each week.

Colossians 1:9-10, NIV

For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you. We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives, so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God,...

As discussed in Riverside's HGLT (Home Group Leader Training), these guides are to be starting points for home group leaders to develop their own guides and approaches to leading group discussions. This is a resource tool, not a rigid "go through this guide word-for-word." There are intentionally too many questions for a single home group time.
